

## From the Pastor's Desk



Beginning this weekend and for the next four Sunday's, the gospel reading will be taken from the 6th Chapter of St. John, which is also sometimes referred to as the 'Bread of Life' discourse

This chapter from the Gospel of John contains probably the deepest and richest Eucharistic theology in scripture. It begins with what we heard today, which is the multiplication of the loaves and fishes.

The multiplication of the bread and fish is the only miracle that is found in all 4 gospels (found twice each in the gospels of Matthew and Mark, once in Luke and once in John). In all of the presentations, Jesus takes bread, breaks it and gives it to the disciples. The same words are also used at the Last Supper.

There is one other detail that only John reports and that is that the 5 loaves and 2 fish belong to a small boy. Jesus first asks Philip about being able to buy food for the crowd and he sees it as a hopeless situation. Andrew, on the other hand, says that he'll see what he can do, and trusts Jesus to do the rest.

Let me share a story. A priest was doing visitations and he was meeting with a young couple who had 3 children, the oldest one was 5. The parents were getting the 2 younger children settled and so they left the 5 year old and the priest together in the living room. The priest decided he would make some conversation with the young boy by asking him what he wanted to be when he grew up. Without any hesitation at all, the boy said, I want to be 'possible' when I grow up. When the priest questioned him about what he meant, the boy said that there isn't a day that goes by that my mom doesn't tell me how impossible I am, so I figure that some day when I grow up, I can be possible.

Think about it, Andrew didn't know what would happen when he presented that boy to Jesus, but he was providing the material for miracles. We never know the possibilities we are releasing, when we bring someone to Jesus.

The boy did not have much to offer, but he trusted and gave what he had. The world might be denied miracle after miracle because we don't bring Jesus what we have and who we are. We need to bring ourselves into intimate communion with Christ, which we experience when we worthily receive his Body and Blood. We need to realize our responsibility to bring others, especially the children, into a closer relationship with God. We do this by showing and sharing with them how much God loves us and by making it well known that God is the #1 priority of our life.

Just as the young boy in the gospel may have felt he did not have much to offer, we at times may feel the same way ourselves. But that is no reason for failing to bring what we have to Christ. Little is always much in the hands of Christ and with Jesus, everything and everyone is possible.
